The senior school have been doing daily fitness together. We love working with our buddy class on STEAM activities. Our Purple Day was lots of fun. We help each other with our learning.








Whakapapa

Coming Up in Term 2 Y4-6 Senior School Learning...

We are going to learn the stories of two significant Tuwharetoa chiefs Ngatoroirangi and Tia who arrived from Hawaiki on the Te Arawa waka. Learn the stories of how they journeyed into "Te puku o te ika a Maui" or into the belly of Maui's fish. Along the way we are going to learn and discover the stories of how the region and places in our beautiful community were named by our two chiefs...and where wai or the waters of the lake came from and how we see them today.

Next term the senior school will be continuing with a focus on localised learning through our beautiful community or hapori...a geothermal wonderland as it once was described to us. Our overall arching theme will be Wai or water. We hope to discover, visit, challenge and create our thinking about wai. We hope to explore how our Maori culture uses storytelling to explain their world, why we need to protect our Taupō treasures...stories, environment, water... Look at local and global issues and consider...Is the world today better than the world in the past? What happens when water is a solid, gas or liquid? We aim to venture into all our beautiful curriculum areas with this theme. We look forward to working within our community and we hope you come along and learn alongside us...we love having you here.











Our Learning and Whanau Hui

This term as a senior school we have been looking at student agency. This means that our learners know what they are learning, why they are learning it and more importantly how they know they have learnt it. In the senior school we have introduced reading, writing and math scorecards. These scorecards have all the learning goals that a child needs to be successful at their level of ability. This allows our learners to know what the next level of learning looks like for them. This is then unpacked with all our learners.

Children are being exposed and are starting to use these scorecards to create their own learning goals and next steps. As part of whanau hui or interviews this year we would like all our learners to share with their whanau what they have been learning and what they need to work on next. This will give our learners an audience and build our partnership with all. We believe that partnerships include your child, you and the teacher. All three need to work and walk alongside one another. Please bring your child to the whanau hui or interviews with you.

When ERO or the Education Review Office visited Taupo Primary School (October 2019) one of their recommendations was to ensure that standardised testing was included. We introduced math last year with PAT testing. This has continued again in 2021. However, to improve this for some of our learners we have started using adaptive testing. This is where artificial intelligence measures a child response and adapts the test to make sure it is not too challenging and not too hard. This form of testing has been used with some learners who need extending in their maths or learners who are working above their expected level. Some of these learners are working at level 5 of the NZ Curriculum or years 9-10. Exciting news for our math programs, but challenging to ensure we cater for all our learners. We are lucky to be working again with Vince Wright who lives in our community and is a well known math expert in New Zealand and Australia. Part of the work we are doing is working with Vince for these high level math learners. In 2021 we have also introduced PAT reading. The results of these have not yet been looked at but we are excited to see what the data tells us.

Does your child have dyslexia or dyspraxia?

Early next term the senior school will be working on introducing a Text Help program. This is like an app that can be used on devices across all platforms that we learn in (all classes in Y4-6 are now digital learners). We plan on running some workshops with our learners on how to use this app more efficiently. We have a large number of students who have dyslexia, dyspraxia, auditory processing disorders or find the physical task of typing or writing mentally draining. This app will help support our learner to talk to their devices and record their work or mahi. Removing some of the challenges our learners face. We as teachers look forward to using the app too and making it part of our normalised program. It is predicted that key boards eventually will be obsolete.

The great news is that your child will be able to use this app at home on a home device too. This is simple by logging in through their school email address. How cool is that! This year will be a trial year and we hope it will form part of our long term systemic planning for learners with dyslexia, auditory processing disorder, dyspraxia, and many other barriers our learners face on a daily challenge at school.

I know staff are looking forward to using the app as a tool to...our devices will be able to read back our reports...we will be able to say or orally talk into our device to write up a unit of work for tamariki...much faster to talk than it is to write!
