



It's all about the collaborative science in room 19 as our learners explored sinking and floating concepts by upcycling materials...whilst applying our science model...

Did you know that the octopus is the most inspirational animal as a mythical creature and as monsters in our history? Unlike the Shark, the Octopi has far-reaching, sticky, and frightening tentacles with hundreds of suckers to grab onto possessions...not stubby, triangle fins. With over 300 species of octopus swimming in every ocean, The invertebrate creature have two hard beaks at the underneath of their head. Across this writing piece I can let you know about their appearance, habitat, and lifestyle.


Did you know that they have an appearance kind of like there cousin, a Squid, which also have—extended, sticky, dangerous—tentacles . These are some species. Vulgaris (Common Octopi), Giant Pacific Octopus, and the Mimic Octopus. They are able to change into different colors to camouflage them self from predators and to sneak up on prey. Octopi have three hearts, two of them are for the animals gills; the third one will keep circulation going for the animals organs. Amazingly, Their beak has a name, which is called a "Rostro me", where they can smash items into micro bits. Fun fact, the oldest known octopus fossil is 296 million years old. Did you know an adult Pacific Octopi has around 280 per tentacle. Their Tentacles are 60-90 cm... to be continued


